



Winter Wonders - Southfield, MI Junior UOL

While most of life hunkers down and hibernates from the cold during the w i n t e r months, the Jr. U.O.L. chapter of the Protection of the Birth-Giver of God Ukrainian

Orthodox Cathedral in Southfield, MI does just the opposite. They are the little wonders of winter.

In November, the children took to heart the words His Eminence Archbishop Antony, the Ruling Hierarch of the Eastern Eparchy, spoke at the 2010 Ukrainian Orthodox League Convention. "*They are alone and scared. Go and touch them. Go and bring them cheer and hope, for they are our neighbors and we are to love and care for them all.*" The children heard the challenge and met it. They made their first visit to an elderly assisted living facility in Warren, Michigan. The residents were thrilled to have visitors, and joyfully told stories of their



exploits to the eager young listeners. Since November, the children have visited the residents of the facility twice more. In December the children took on the role of St. Nicholas bringing various gifts to the residents. The most appreciated were the warm and colorful fleece scarves that the kids had made themselves. In January the children went caroling at the same facility. The

elderly residents completely forgot their pains and woes, as they jovially joined in a loud rendition of "Good Evening to You…" (Dobrij Vechir Tobi, Pane Hospodaryu).

In their continued efforts to do "good works," the kids each year collect items for various charities. This year they helped a number of organizations by collecting coats for the Oakland County Sheriff's coat drive "Coats for the Cold," food items and clothing for the South Oakland Shelter, and men's clothing and toiletries for St. Herman's Monastery. The



kids even spent a Sunday afternoon making fleece scarves for the homeless.

When they heard that His Grace Bishop Daniel of the Western Eparchy of the UOC of the USA, was traveling to Ukraine to visit the orphans, the Winter Wonders rallied and collected dozens of toys to ship to New Jersey, so that His Grace might take them with him. It was a joy to see the little kids at the local department store picking out what they thought would be fun for Ukrainian children. In addition to dolls, and cars, there needed to be horses, because everyone knows that all Ukrainian children are direct descendants of

Romanian, etc. It was rewarding to see that no matter what language they spoke, what color their skin, all the children stopped fidgeting and quietly prayed with their parents, crossing themselves, before the event began.

The following Sunday the Jr. U.O.L. chapter participated in their own parish's St. Nicholas



Day Program. It was up to the chapter members to clean and decorate the hall and help the St. Olga's parish sisterhood in the kitchen. While some members performed on stage, others served the food and poured the drinks.

With the St. Nicholas festivities behind them the kids now set their sights on Christmas, and immediately volunteered to decorate the church. Each child found something to do. The littlest volunteer, Lily Powers, kept reminding the older children to "shhhh....! You are still in church," as they hung ornaments, detangled strings of lights, dangled garland, hung wreaths and strategically placed the poinsettias.

On Christmas Eve the chapter began collecting for the future UOC Monastery.

Father Paul Bodnarchuk announced their intentions and explained to those listening what a blessing a monastery is to the Church and her faithful. The children held a poster with an image of a church and a happy monk, lovingly nicknamed Monach *Monomakh*, in honor of *Volodymyr Monomakh who instructed his children in his Poucheniie ditiam* (Instruction for [My] Children, ca 1117) stating "may you hasten to do all good acts and praise the Lord with His saints." With Father Paul's encouraging words still ringing in their ears, the faithful quickly filled the children's baskets. To increase the donations



the kids also manned the "bar," by having purchased and served free soft drinks and water to those who were partaking of the Lenten Holy Christmas Eve Supper. In response, people gladly offered them "tips" which they added to the monastery donation basket. The Christmas Eve donations totaled \$111.



While the kids were thrilled with that number they were in awe the next few days. On Friday, which was the Feast of the Nativity of our Lord, the children once again stood at the door asking for donations. These donations amazingly added up to \$333. The kids were squealing with joy when they saw the numbers and added them up: \$111 + \$333 =

\$444!

But, wait, it gets even better. The following Sunday, the children once again decided to ask for donations, taking into account that some people were not able to attend the Nativity services and therefore, hadn't had an opportunity to donate to the cause. As they stood at the door one more time, Monach *Monomakh* seemed to wink happily as the basket filled up. With smiles and twinkling eyes the kids eagerly counted the dollars to see what fantastic number would show up this time. Amazingly their Sunday collection totaled \$123!

Now, as if that wasn't awesome enough, when you add the sums together, 444 + 123 = 567! The chapter is now pumped to keep collecting via various fundraisers through June with the goal in mind of \$999!

In December the children participated in two St. Nicholas Day programs. The first was on the 18th and was sponsored by the C.O.C.C. (Council of Orthodox Christian Churches). The program took place at St. Thomas

Albanian Orthodox Church and was a great opportunity for the Ukrainian youth to see that Orthodoxy comes in many shades, colors and nationalities. The kids got to mingle with youngsters from various Orthodox parishes – Greek, Russian, Albanian, Macedonian, Serbian, Antiochian, Bulgarian,

On Theophany the children of the chapter assisted Father Paul by holding the candles during the blessing of the water. The children also filled extra jars, affixed labels to them and delivered the bottles of holy water to our elderly parishioners and shut-ins,

who otherwise would not have access to the blessings provided by the sanctified water.

Besides all these tasks, twice each month the chapter is responsible for providing the faithful with a post Liturgy meal. The usual dishes are borscht and varenyky! While it seemed a menial and burdensome task to them at first, they have now gotten into the habit, and with no prompting run to the kitchen to take up their posts. Some kids ladle the steaming and aromatic borscht, while others fill plates with gleaming varenyky, pour the coffee, and take the orders. Kitchen duty has been rewarding on many fronts. It has forced the kids to interact with the parishioners while taking their orders and filling them. Previously shy children now openly talk to everyone. Other members have honed their math skills by counting out the change, while others have learned to cook Ukrainian dishes. It's a win-win situation.

While one may automatically associate "winter wonders" with snow, the Southfield parishioners know better. They never cease to be amazed at the energy and ingenuity of the children of their parish Jr.U.O.L chapter as they watch them always flitting about doing one task or another around the church.

These Winter Wonders aren't slowing down, even with all the snow. Having assisted their human "neighbors," they now have an eye on the four legged kind. Their next project consists of helping their local branch of the Humane Society by constructing "kitty forts" which will provide some sense of security for the kittens that nobody wanted.

These kids have such big hearts and are so excited to help others, that is it any wonder that the children of the Southfield chapter of the Jr.U.O.L. are considered to be Winter Wonders?

Are you interested in travelling to Ukraine with a UOL Group?






